

HALE, continuing to Elizabeth: Let you not mistake your duty as I mistook my own. I came into this village like a bridegroom to his beloved, bearing gifts of high religion; the very crowns of holy law I brought, and what I touched with my bright confidence, it died; and where I turned the eye of my great faith, blood flowed up. Beware, Goody Proctor – cleave to no faith when faith brings blood. It is mistaken law that leads you to sacrifice. Life, woman, life is God's most precious gift; no principle, however glorious, may justify the taking of it. I beg you, woman, prevail upon your husband to confess. Let him give his lie. Quail not before God's judgment in this, for it may well be God damns a liar less than he that throws his life away for pride. Will you plead with him? I cannot think he will listen to another.

#### Warm-Up 9/17/19

- Imagine you're in a situation like those accused of witchcraft in Salem.

  - You have to confess to evil deeds, get your reputation totally ruined, and put blame on other friends and neighbors, knowing they are probably innocent too.

#### One Important Moment

    - Proctor's decided his conflict between living shamefully (giving up his name) and dying nobly (ending the trials).

#### Character Review

#### • Characters:

#### Review:

- What did they want? What was their motivation?
- How were they related to other characters?
   (connections, conflicts, etc.)
- What was their stance on the trials? (Who was to blame? What was fair? Who should have power? How did their ideas change?)
- Important moments & ending fate

#### Idea Review

- What made the trials so bad?
  - What was the atmosphere in Salem like before the trials? Why?
    - How did people treat each other?
  - Why did accusations spread? What motivated people? Why did they believe the girls?
- Why John Proctor's fate?
  - What led Proctor to be jailed? (think series of cause -> effect)
  - What influenced Proctor's decision to not confess? What were the consequences? Why couldn't Elizabeth choose for him?

# Fully explaining why:

- "The girls who danced in the woods started blaming everyone to protect themselves.
   Some of it also has to do with their culture and suspicion that's been building up. People in charge didn't care if they were false accusations or set-ups, they just wanted to catch witches."
- "Everything is spiraling out of control because everyone is going along with it (mob mentality). Example: Mary Warren started making up lies because everyone else was. In the beginning she wanted to tell the truth"

# Link back to an idea/definition:

- "The Puritans had a very strong belief that they had to stick together to fight off attempts of the devil and to survive. We see that in The Crucible by the people in the town being so afraid to tell the truth. Because if they told the truth, it is a possibility they would die or worse be cast out of the congregation/village."
- Archetype: "Abigail could fit this because of the relationship she had with Proctor. Abigail is extremely intelligent, she knows that if she makes an accusation against Elizabeth that she would be punished if she didn't admit to the accusation"

Tell why it matters /
Connect to big ideas:

 "Rules can be productive and can help lead to a stable society, but when basic freedoms are taken and rules go too strict, it could cause people to rebel. For example when the ladies were dancing in the forest, it was innocent to them and it was fun, but in the eyes of the town and Puritanism it was against their rules."
