

- Home: across East Coast, died in Baltimore, MD
- Main Ideas:
 - Curious about link between body & mind
 - Known for spooky, mystery-like stories

 - When Emerson heard he was buried in a pauper's grave, he drove down & reburied him with a proper funeral



Washington Irving

• Lived: 1783-1859

• Home: New York

• Main Ideas:


· Curious about American history & culture

- Focused on local charm & established style for later authors
- Fun Fact: https://youtu.be/lpUP1CEQeTQ
 - He first called NYC "Gotham" city & popularized the myth that Columbus-era people thought the world was flat



Nathaniel Hawthorne

- Lived: 1804-1864
- Home: Born in Salem, MA. Lived in Concord, MA near Emerson.
- Main Ideas:
 - Family heritage was Puritan but friends were Transcendentalists
 - Torn over Great American Paradox
- Fun Fact: https://youtu.be/OWSdRsGLIto
 - Rented Emerson's house, "The Old Manse" & graffitied a window



Major Movements & Locations

- On the map:
 - Mark major locations where our authors/stories have been set
 - Puritans Emerson Romantic/Gothic authors
- On the back:
 - At the beginning & end of the arrows, write dates & causes (e.g. Why did the Puritans crumble?)
 - Under/inside each arrow write author names we've read who fit that movement

 - The opposite of a run-on sentence is a fragment, a phrase that isn't a complete sentence on its own.
 - Example: "On a fine autumnal afternoon, <u>Ichabod</u>, in pensive mood, <u>was enthroned</u> on the lofty stool from whence he usually <u>watched</u> all the concerns"
 - **Test Tip:** Read the entire sentence, circle the subject, and underline the <u>verb</u>. Then look for correct punctuation AND verb tense.

Writing Tips

- NO lonely quotes
 - Emerson argues, "..." (Emerson 2).
 - For example, Taylor starts to realize: "..." (Kingsolver 45).
- MLA formatting
 - · Check the cheat sheet I gave you
 - Insert page number, add last name, make TNR 12
 - MUST have Works Cited

Writing Tips

- NO "I", "me", "you", or "We"
 - "Emerson says people should be self-reliant"
 - "One must try their best" or "Everyone must try their best"
- NO "The quote says" or "In this quote"
 - "In this quote, Emerson argued..."
 - "The quote shows self-reliance is important to..."

Writing Tips

- Active vs. Passive
 - Passive = "It is clear that the two connect"
 - Active = "The two clearly connect because..."
- Tense
 - Past = historic facts = "Emerson explained these ideas when he wrote 'Self-Reliance"
 - Present = events/ideas in text = "Oskar says..." or "Ender experiences social corruption..."
